

Foreign lorry focus for safer roads and fairer market

The Public Accounts Committee (PAC) report into the regulation of commercial vehicles will provide a welcome focus on the issue of unsafe overseas lorries and driving practices.



o Tanner, the FTA's Director of Communications said: The Public Accounts Committee is quite right to be concerned about the number of overseas trucks on UK roads, and their poor safety record. Tired drivers operating vehicles in poor mechanical condition are accidents waiting to happen. VOSA has done a good job in clamping down on non-compliant foreign lorries at the roadside but because there is no meaningful monitoring of these vehicles, authorities have no idea who is on our roads or where they are travelling to or from."

Overseas trucks tend to fill

their tanks with diesel bought outside the UK, where fuel duty is far lower, so not only do they avoid contributing to the UK economy at the pumps they also put domestic truckers at a massive commercial disadvantage. Jo Tanner concluded: "Overseas operators effectively drive on the UK's roads for free. as they contribute nothing to Treasury coffers while the British taxpayer picks up the tab for the damage they cause. This isn't the first report to highlight the inadequacies of taxation on these overseas vehicles, and sadly it probably won't be the last. What we need now is action."

UVB raise money for Help the Heroes

nique Van Bodies and James Removals were involved in raising funds for Help the Heroes at the recent Movers and Storers Show.

UVB built a 1/14 scale remote control Scania Tractor unit with trailer painted and lettered to James Removals' specification. Participants were challenged to race against the clock around a

25ft by 25ft obstacle course including bridges, tunnels and cones using the James Removals remote-controlled articulated lorry. At £5 a go all money raised went to Help the Heroes, the official charity of The Movers and Storers Show. Nearly £500 was raised.
